# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

# 1.1 INTRODUCTION

North Bank College is one of the oldest sole premier institutions of Higher Education, established at Ghilamara, a historically legendary place, situated in between the River Brahmaputra and Subansiri in the

District of Lakhimpur, in 1961 as a result of selfless and untiring efforts of some far sighted and virgin minded people of this area. The surrounding area of the institution is economically very backward burdened with the poor social infrastructure and flood prone rural area mostly inhabited by S.T., S.C. and other backward Tribes like –Mising ,Kaibarta, Ahom, Chutia, Konch, Bodo, Sonowal Kachari, Tiwa and a few Gen eral Caste.

The College has both Arts and Science (Yet to be Provincialized) Stream and has been imparting quality higher education in 16 disciplines affiliated to the Univer sity of Dibrugarh, leading to B.A. & B.Sc. degree. In the current academic session there is enrolment of not less than 1500 students in H.S. and undergraduate course. The beauty of the college is sticking with its staff quarters and inclusion under 2(F) and 12(B) Sections of the UGC Act 1956.

North Bank College is surrounded by several landmarks of his- torical importance including Basudev Than, Ghoguha Dol and the Mohghuli Chapori. All these places are located at the distance 600Km. from the nearest 15 No. N.H, Dhemaji and Lakhimpur District head quar- ters are well connected through the 15 No. N.H. The College has achieved a good and satisfactory performance in 2nd cycle NAAC Accreditation in spite of limited resources.

# 1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

# **Institutional Strength**

- North Bank College aims to provide quality education to its students. A dedicated, scholarly group of teachers is definitely one of the institutions' biggest strength.
- A well maintained NCC & NSS unit of the college can also be considered as one of its strength.
- The institution has collaborations & MoUs with several local organizations, institutions, farms etc. to provide experiential learning to the students.
- In an effort to increase self-employment and entrepreneurship among students, the college has introduced **Twelve Diploma/Certificate Courses**.
- Through the Extension Cell, Women Cell, Career Counselling & Guidance Cell, NSS, NSS Committee etc. the college is continuously conducting Community Linkage Programmes.
- Faculty members carry out "Students Home Visit" program to build organic linkage with students and their parents.
- The entire administration & management is highly **transparent** and the delegation of authority is carried out in a well-planned manner.
- The college has introduced digital initiatives to bring out transparency in areas of admission, results, form-fill up and a few other areas.
- The institution is **generating meagre amount of revenue** from vermicomposting pant and fish farming.
- The college's bio-vibrant campus provides proper habitat for a variety of animals, plants, birds and reptiles. One great resource that offers space for outdoor games is the college's large playground.
- The college is conveniently located by the side of the State Highway.
- The college has a comparatively large area with more than 9 acres (29 bighas) of land.
- The institution has a high number of valuable trees and flowers inside the campus including several varieties of orchid, segun and other trees.

#### **Institutional Weakness**

- Being situated in a very remote area of the Lakhimpur district is one of the biggest weakness of the institution.
- In comparison to the number of students of the college there is lack of faculties and non-teaching staff that has hampered to some extent, in imparting quality education.
- Poor infrastructure of the college is another serious drawback of the college.
- Lack of sufficient numbers of digital and smart classrooms is also another weakness of the college.
- Lack of adequate computer knowledge of the office staff and to some extent of some faculty members is

another weakness of the institution as a whole.

- Being situated in a flood prone zone with other socio-economic challenges of the region also adds to the weakness of the institution.
- Among other institutional weaknesses, lack of MoUs with Industries and Organizations for the generation of employment facility is also to be counted.

# **Institutional Opportunity**

- North Bank College has been running Science stream on its own; however, the institution can find a way in proper discussion with Govt. to provincialize the science stream.
- The college can introduce PG courses in some of the departments.
- North Bank College has full opportunity to start some add on/ certificate/ diploma etc. courses.
- The institution can make arrangement for distance courses and online open learning programs including MOOC, SWAYAM Platform etc.
- North Bank College has enough opportunity to develop a few centres for the Training of Local Handicrafts, Sericulture, Horticulture, Pisciculure etc. in a large scale.

The Alumni of the college has to be increased and their involvements has also to be increased.

#### **Institutional Challenge**

Increase of administrative workload of the faculty members after the implementation of CBCS has adverse effects on the quality of teaching.

Lack of sufficient teaching staff occasionally makes it difficult for the programmes to run smoothly. Delay in sanctioning posts of office staff by the government is another challenge for the institution. Delay in receiving Government grants is a major barrier to the institution's ability to operate effectively.

Lack of adequate communication facilities for the faculties and students has been one of the toughest challenges.

The institution may encounter various challenges for proper implementation of NEP 2020.

Most of the students of the college come from low income families and some of them are even unable to attend college on a regular basis because of financial constraints.

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# 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

# **Curricular Aspects**

**NORTH BANK COLLEGE, GHILAMARA**, has employed an effective mechanism for the systematic implementation and delivery of the curriculum as per the UGC Regulations and objectives set by Dibrugarh University (Assam).

The College has **35 Undergraduate programmes**. The CBCS system was implemented in 2019 as per the regulations of the university

During the assessment period, the institution introduced new 5 Diploma and 2 Certificate

Programs, focusing on skill and entrepreneurship development.

The IQAC monitors the curricular planning process through a well – documented procedure involving the strategic plan, university academic calendar, college academic calendar, department teaching plans, prospectus etc.

Teachers have been involved in the setting of question papers, Attending Meetings Related to Conducting Semester Examinations by the Affiliating University, serving as Members of Board of Directors of the Dibrugarh University, conducting of examinations and evaluation process, conducted by Dibrugarh University.

ICT classes are regularly conducted. The College has it's Smart Classrooms with Well-Equipped Modern Gadgets.

The College deals with cross – cutting issues related to professional ethics, gender, human values, and environment and sustainability both within and outside the classroom. As per the Non – CBCS (2011 – 19) and CBCS (2019 onwards) programmes, several courses have covered these issues respectively during the assessment period.

All 35 UG programmes include experiential learning and project works in their curriculum, involving compulsory courses, social leadership activities and educational field visits. Various Cells / Clubs / Committees of the college also organize programmes to help in curricular planning.

The **Feedback Committee of the college** is involved in the **collection of feedback (online and offline)** and their **Suggestions** from the various stakeholders, based on which appropriate measures are taken and the **Action Taken Reports** are displayed in the college website.

Teachers have been involved in various bodies such as the **BoS**, **Undergaduate Board** (**CBCS**), **Academic Council**, **Executive Council and Court** of Dibrugarh University, and appropriate stakeholder feedback is communicated in these bodies.

# **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The Teaching-Learning strategy of **NORTH BANK COLLEGE**, **GHILAMARA** is **student centric** and **inclusive of the state-of-the-art practices**. The practices are **interactive**, **interdisciplinary**, **experiential and transparent** which help students in achieving all round development.

The institution **identifies the potentialities of the students** and customizes curriculum and pedagogy as per their aptitude.

The College has 5 Diploma and 2 Certificate Courses for enhancing employability and skills among the students.

Teachers use standardized participatory methodology and use blended mode and innovative ways as well.

The students are engaged in **hands-on learning**, **co-curricular activities**, **community service** and field based social research.

The College recognizes the **global digital revolution** and equips the classroom and seminar halls with ICT tools.

Teachers regularly use ICT tools, Email Sharing, Google storage, video streaming, slide sharing, instant messaging platforms and online assignments etc.

The **evaluation process of the college is robust, fair, transparent** and properly monitored so that students feel

empowered.

The **Internal Assessment is conducted regularly** as per the Academic Calendar of the College (and The Affiliating University) by means of Sessional Examination, Group Discussion, Seminar, Projects and Assignments and other innovative methods.

The College has Fairly Maintained Grievance Redressal mechanism.

The students can see their evaluated answer scripts of Internal Assessment, and any grievance or discrepancy in the evaluation is resolved at the earliest.

The College displays the Course Outcomes [CO] and Programme Outcomes [PO] in the **College Notice Board** and communicates to the students at the beginning of the Academic Session.

The Departments and the IQAC takes special agenda for orienting the students with the COs of all Programmes. The Guardians are also acquainted with the COs.

The College has been maintaining a handsome percentage of enrolment and passing out students throughout the years and all dedicated teachers (Some of which are Ph. D. holders) guide them to succeed in life.

The attainment of COs and POs are measured by means of classroom interactions, internal assessment, performance in the End-Semester Examinations and students' participation in co-curricular activities.

#### Research, Innovations and Extension

The cumulative efforts of the Research Cell, and other Cells and Clubs have created an ambient ecosystem for development of innovative platform of social importance. The Committees under IQAC are working with the objective to create research environment in the college. The committees have organized various national, state and college level seminars, workshops, webinars, special talks, etc. to create an eco-system for innovation, incubation and start up for the students and neighboring community.

The College has organised various workshops on **Entrepreneurship Development** in association with Alumni Association and other organisations for under graduate students and other stakeholders to startup their own enterprises.

Research projects in relation to the socio economic condition of the neighborhood community undertaken by the college in the last five years significantly addressed the Socio-Economic condition of the people. The college has taken it as a moral responsibility to work with these issues and adopted five villages as nurtured villages. Besides, for the benefit of the students, the college has started various skill development courses in collaboration with other institutions by signing MOUs.

As part of the Diploma/Certificate courses, internship, on the job training, incubation and start-up programmes, workshops have been organized. A unit of Vermicomposting plant has been set up in the college premises along with fisheries and Orchid Plantation.

Under the **Umbrella of NCC & NSS Unit of the college**, various other clubs and cells were formed around the surrounding villages and academic and labour force etc., were provided to each of them.

All these help the students to gain experiential learning and acquaint themselves with the problems of the society and make them competent enough to cope up with these problems.

# **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

North Bank College does have adequate infrastructural facilities but they are not all well equipped with modern and technologically advanced gadgets. It has however, sufficient number of classrooms which are spacious, neat and clean and some rooms are furnished with smart Audio-Visual gadgets including smart projectors etc. this college has 1Conference Hall. All the departments of Science along with some selected Arts departments have laboratory facilities. It has also one Computer Laboratory. Apart from academic facilities, it has also adequate facilities for cultural and sports related developments of the students. North Bank College has proper facilities for sports, games and cultural events. It has an outdoor stadium with well-furnished galleries and a sophisticated indoor stadium. The outdoor stadium contains the provisions for one football ground, two volleyball ground, one cricket pitch and athletics facilities. The indoor stadium of the college has the provision for one badminton court.

The central library of the college is automated with the leading software SOUL 3.0 designed and developed by INFLIBNET Centre. It is used for generating membership card, book card, spine label etc. In the library various sections are available such as general reference, periodicals, newspapers, OPAC and Internet section. This

library has free Wi-Fi service too available in all parts of the library.

The institute has a Tender/Purchase Committee which looks after annual plan and budget of the institute. The institute audits it year wise financial transactions appointing internal auditor.

The institute has several numbers of well-functioning computers which could be readily used by the students for academic purposes.

North Bank College has tried its best to provide Audio-visual cum Digital IT tools inside the classrooms for the benefit of the students. There are 04 rooms with well-connected Audio Microphone. Besides, it has 03 number of rooms with Overhead Projectors, 02 nos of rooms with Smart Digital Panels. The college has a well-functioning college Website that helps everyone to get latest Academic or college related information. North Bank college has a semi-automated process of admission and we have been striving our best to achieve fully automated status.

# **Student Support and Progression**

North Bank College provides necessary assistance to the students to make them employable as well as responsible and to enable them to acquire meaningful experience for learning.

Students are the real spine of any educational institution and the criteria focuses on different levels of mechanism on the part of the institution like Career Guidance Cell, Students' Grievance Redressal Cell and welfare measures etc. Various support activities and Programs are organized from time to time to guide the students relating to soft skill, life skill, communication skill, ICT Computation programme etc. The Grievance Redressal Cell always tries to solve the students problems and when it is recorded.

The scholarships and free ship (both governmental and institutional) received by the needy students are highlighted in the criteria. Being situated in rural area and most of the students belong to poor family, the faculties also help the students in cash, kind any other measures of guidance.

Student's progression and placement also remained topmost priority for all the teachers. Every year students from different subject move to different higher educational institution including Dibrugarh University, Gauhati University etc., to fulfill their dream and most of the students get employment opportunities in different govt. and non-govt enterprises. North Bank College has also made an attempt to run and introduce various Vocational Programs and Training to increase the chance to employability among the students.

Our students are immensely talented. To nurture their cultural and sports talents the college has provided enough infrastructural and other related facilities and support to the college students.

The alumni are a strong part of an institution. The college has a well-functioning and it has contributed a lot in academic matters, guide the students and mobilizing resources both in financial and non-financial way. Every department has their own Alumni Association and they keep close relationship with their respective departments.

# Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution implements all Govt. welfare schemes meant for the employees. The teachers are given financial allowances to participate in seminar, workshop etc and also provide leave on Duty for FIP,STC, RC, OC, FDP, research work etc. The college maintains a 'Tender/Purchase Committee,' constituted by the Governing body and headed by the Principal.

The said committee is responsible for the construction of new buildings, purchasing of books and journals, class equipment etc. Financial grants are allocated from both the Government and non-government sources. The Principal is accountable for all the financial transactions of the college along with other supporting staff. The institution conducts external and internal audits for both Government and Non-Government funds.

The IQAC of the college aims to promote measures for institutional functioning towards quality enhancement through institutionalisation of best practices. North Bank College has been observing **Orchid Plantation Program** as part of its best practices among others to create awareness among the students regarding preservation of local flora and fauna as well as culture.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

North Bank College is dedicated to Impart value education to the students and spread a value based education in its surrounding areas. Its general course followed after the same designed by the affiliating university is committed to impart social and moral value based education. Besides, through NCC and NSS units of the college humanitarian values including sympathy, empathy etc. Through the agency of NSS and NCC the Institution organizes awareness programmes, workshops, training, blood donation camps etc. to support the neighboring community. The students are encouraged to understand the social problems and to work for their solutions through field survey, case study analysis and social research.

North Bank College is also determined to maintain Gender Equity in the College and the society through the arrangement of several programs, talk-shows, popular lectures etc.. Besides, celebration and Observation of popular days like National Girl child Day etc.

Being situated in a rural and remote location, North Bank College is rich in bio-diversity, and the authority has taken adequate measures to preserve its rich biodiversity. The College has a proper orchid plantation and fish breeding. For energy efficiency and reuse LED bulbs are used at the optimal level. Green and Energy Audit is done and Biodiversity Report is prepared by Eco Club.

Annual Internal Audit is done regularly. Programmes are carried out for tolerance and harmony towards socio economic diversity. National and international commemorative days are observed to develop students as responsible citizens.

# **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

North Bank College, Ghilamara basically offers higher education in the fields of Arts and Science. In both the streams, the College follows the CBCS curriculum set forth by Dibrugarh University, Assam. The current CBCS is prepared with a perspective to creating opportunities for interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approach. The Academic Council of Dibrugarh University has shown a strong interest in using interdisciplinary strategy in the teaching-learning process. CBCS syllabus has introduced some courses which are intra-departmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) as well as interdepartmental, i.e., Generic Elective (GE). The students have to choose minimum number of DS and

GE in every semester as prescribed in the Course Structure. These courses have been developing students as skilled personnel. DSE Courses are primarily intra-disciplinary in nature. GE courses are inter-disciplinary and students of other discipline/ subjects can opt these electives. North Bank College has implemented two types of Ability Enhancement courses under CBCS curriculum i.e.- 'Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses' and 'Skill Enhancement Courses'. 'AEC' Courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement. i. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC 1 & 2):(a) Environmental Science (2 Credit), (b) Communicative English (2 Credit) and (c) Alternative English/ MIL (2 Credit). Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and contain both theory and lab/handson/training/fieldwork. With these courses we tend to increase employability among the students. In addition to these, the college has introduced certain strategies in connection to Implementing multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach in the institution. These are: i) Faculty Exchange within the College . ii) Popular Talks and Lecture Programs by College Teachers . iii) Inter-institution collaboration for the benefit of the students on both academic and non-academic fields. iv) Field Works, Internship, Extension Works etc.

#### 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

North Bank College has planned to collaborate with various academic institutes to maintain an Academic Bank of Credits for its students. Although this institute is yet to register it under the ABC to permit its learners to avail the benefit of multiple entries and exit during the chosen program, but this institution has been very much flexible as far as entry and exit of the students is concerned. We are planning to tie ourselves up with other higher education institutes so that this multiple entry and exit for the students could be smoothly implemented. North Bank College inspires the faculties to update themselves, prepare various study materials and other staff for the smooth implementation of ABC program

# 3. Skill development:

Skill development remains one of the topmost priority of North Bank College to create a new well skilled generation. Following the frameworks of

National Skills Qualifications Framework, North Bank College has emphasized on the implementation of outcome based vocational education. It has adopted several such steps that can train up the students like teaching Yoga, organizing a Vermicomposting plant etc. Besides, through the strengthening of already running NCC and NSS programs, North Bank College is trying to inculcate more humane values including mutual help, righteous conduct, peace, co-operation, scientific temper, citizenship values and other life-skills etc.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

North Bank College follows the syllabus prepared by the Dibrugarh University and the concerned affiliating university has already prepared the syllabus keeping in mind various Indian languages, culture and literature. "Indian Classical Literature" for B.A. English (Honours) is taught in B.A. 1st Semester. The course's goal is to introduce students to the rich literary heritage of ancient India, particularly Sanskrit literature. The CBCS syllabus includes courses on Indian sociological thought, modern Indian literature, and Indian political thought, among other topics, to make students aware of the rich traditions of the Indian knowledge system. In order to help pupils quickly understand the concepts, classroom instructions are generally given in vernacular medium. On yoga and meditation, the college has organized workshops and awareness programmes. The central library of the college is well stocked with books in both English and Assamese literature on religion, art and culture. The faculty members of this college impart their hard earned knowledge mostly through the medium of either English or Assamese language. The faculties of this college are already well trained in English and Assamese language to teach the students. The college, in addition to following the university designed courses, is also planning to establish various study centers in local language and other classical and vernacular Indian languages.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Keeping in tune with the NEP 2020, North Bank College is committed to take initiatives to bring in Outcome Based Education (OBE) among the students. As a result of this commitment, we have adopted result and outcome oriented courses in our college. Various certificate courses are being planned to implement this outcome based education.

#### Mechanism

Performance Appraisal System :

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The Governing Body of the college in collaboration with the Principal, Academic Council and the core team of IQAC takes feedback on the performance of the teachers on the regular basis from the students. Teachers are informed about their drawbacks or needs and accordingly the teachers try to update themselves according to the need of the time and students.

The following mechanisms are in practice for appraisal of performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff.

- 1. The teaching staff members have to keep record of all his /her activities/performance on Teacher's Diary, Teacher's Log Book and Monthly Report. These records are to be submitted to the Principal periodically and he examines and verified these.
- 2. Students are given the opportunity to provide their feedback on the performance of the teachers. The feedback forms are available offline and contain questions which are structured to elicit responses for parameters like communication skills, subject knowledge, discipline, work-ethics, etc.

- Students had learnt the value of local flora and fauna, especially orchid.
- · Eminent Assamese folk artist Mr. Anil Saikia had highly appreciated this orchid plantation program.

## **BEST PRACTICE - II**

Title: - FISH BREEDING AND REARING SCHEME

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#### **OBJECTIVES OF THE PRACTICE:**

- 1. To generate a source of livelihood for the unemployed youths to become self-sufficient and financially independent.
- 2. To provide firsthand knowledge to the students of the college for gathering information about the rearing of fish.

#### THE CONTEXT

The college has established a fish breeding and rearing centre inside the college campus. The institution has provided the required area for the establishment of the centre and offered necessary support for resource mobilization and production variety of fishes in collaboration with local organizations namely-Moinapara Bohumukhi Samabai Samiti and Madhukulya Aquatic Farm.

## THE PRACTICE

The college has introduced the practice of breeding and rearing different fish species and many private fishery owners have been benefitting commercially from this practice who are collecting different breeds of fish for their own fisheries.
